### THE SHORE (Symphony No. 3)

- -- Poetry by David St. John
  - 1. The Tidepools & the Boy
  - 2. One Shore
  - 3. The Black Gondola
  - 4. Redemption

The four poems comprising the choral symphony, The Shore, are linked by their settings: places where land and water meet. Three of the poems are set at a beach, while the third poem is set in Venice with its black gondola as a symbol of death (set musically as a hybrid—part passacaglia, part tarantella). Sea images figure prominently in both the poetry and the music, as well as a rich palette of moods evoked by the sea: playfulness, awe, terror, and ultimately, calm and tranquility. A life journey unfolds, from innocent childhood, through young adulthood and crisis, and finally to redemption.

The Shore was commissioned by the Pacific Chorale and Phillip N. and Mary A. Lyons in celebration of Artistic Director John Alexander's 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary season.

#### THE SONG WITHIN

-- Poetry by Frank Ticheli

The Song Within is an a cappella setting of an original poem whose dramatic flow moves from themes of hope and peace, to crisis, and finally to reconciliation. During the setting of the first two stanzas, the music searches in vain for resolution, traveling restlessly from one tonal area to another before finally resigning itself in the poignant key of B minor. The third stanza represents a crisis of faith. Its first two lines are first announced by a male soloist, and then answered by

the chorus as the mood turns darker. The words from these two lines are repeated over and over among the four families of the choir, juxtaposed upon each other in an extended *agitato* section. Then, after a moment of vulnerability, the poem and the music move towards resolution. Darkness yields to themes of transcendence as the singers discover an inner light.

The Song Within was commissioned by the singers of Pacific Chorale in celebration of John Alexander's 30th anniversary season as Artistic Director.

I want to hear the sounds of hope – Of big church bells and distant horns, Sounds that wash away the wars And arouse the human heart. A sure harmony gliding over a sea of stillness.

I want to play the sounds of peace— Of sighing winds and rustling leaves, Sounds that silence troubled thoughts And calm the spirit's raging storms. A song of serenity from high atop an ancient hill.

But my harp is stilled by voices— Children, hungry, crying out. Their dreams, windswept, My house of wisdom, a web of sorrow. I only know that I am longing... And then...I catch a glimpse— An ancient tree...an open gaze, Some eternal euphony That dances upon the light. And for one fleeting moment, I know...

I am the sound of hope, The instrument of peace, The song within the Song.

#### CONSTELLATION

(Three Poems of Sara Teasdale)

- 1. From the Sea
- 2. The Falling Star
- 3. There Will be Stars

Constellation is my second choral setting of Sara Teasdale's poetry, the first being There Will Be Rest in 1999. Teasdale (1884-1933) cultivated a poetic style that has its roots in the works of Sappho, Christina Rossetti, and Housman – and I have long been drawn to her poems for their gentle lyricism and fragile tone. Haunted by depression in later years, Teasdale took her own life at the age of 48. Many of her poems address the pain that tormented her spir-

it, but to the end she seemed to draw strength from the stars and their undying radiance. Each of the three poems I chose for this cycle thus reflects her recurring preoccupation with stellar imagery as a powerful symbol of eternal beauty and peace. Her words almost set themselves, inspiring natural, flowing melodic lines and vivid sound worlds. Feelings of longing and melancholy – never far from the surface – are poignantly balanced by feelings of hope and an underlying sense of awe and wonder.

Constellation was commissioned by the California chapter of the American Choral Directors Association.

#### 1. From the Sea

For us no starlight stilled the April fields, No birds awoke in darkling trees for us, Yet where we walked the city's street that night Felt in our feet the singing fire of spring, And in our path we left a trail of light Soft as the phosphorescence of the sea When night submerges in the vessel's wake A heaven of unborn evanescent stars.

### 2. The Falling Star

I saw a star slide down the sky, Blinding the north as it went by, Too burning and too quick to hold, Too lovely to be bought or sold, Good only to make wishes on And then forever to be gone.

#### 3. There Will be Stars

There will be stars over the place forever; Though the house we loved and the street we loved are lost, Every time the earth circles her orbit

On the night the autumn equinox is crossed, Two stars we knew, poised on the peak of midnight

Will reach their zenith; stillness will be deep; There will be stars over the place forever, There will be stars forever, while we sleep.

#### HERE TAKE THIS LOVELY FLOWER

-- Traditional Shaker melody, arr. Ticheli

Singing was a vital component of Shaker worship and everyday life. Over 8,000 songs in some 800 songbooks were created in Shaker communities throughout New England, most of them during the 1830's to 1860's.

"Here Take This Lovely Flower" is what Shakers refer to as a *gift song*, claimed by them to have been received from spirits. It was intended as a lullaby for children. Although Shakers practiced celibacy, there were many children in their communities, including offspring of recent converts and orphans whom they took in. Like many Shaker songs, this lullaby embodies the Shakers' ideal of childlike simplicity.

Here take this lovely flower Thy mother sent to thee, Cull'd from her lovely bower Of sweet simplicity.

O place it near thy bosom And keep it pure and bright, For in such lovely flowers The angels take delight.

#### **EARTH SONG**

-- Poetry by Frank Ticheli

Earth Song, for a cappella SATB chorus, was composed partly out of a desire to meet a very specific personal creative challenge: to create a poem that would fit pre-existing music. The music, borrowed from a section of my wind ensem-

ble work, *Sanctuary*, seemed ideal for a choral adaptation, its lyrical quality and poignant expression practically crying out for words. Actually *doing* this was not so easy – usually the music comes after the words – but the process was genuine fun, and I never could have written the poem as it now stands without the benefit of having the music first. I am very pleased with the results. *Earth Song* occupies a completely different musical universe from its parent work, one that can only be reached through the marriage of words and music.

Sing, Be, Live, See...

This dark stormy hour, The wind, it stirs. The scorched earth Cries out in vain:

O war and power, You blind and blur. The torn heart Cries out in pain.

But music and singing Have been my refuge, And music and singing Shall be my light. A light of song Shining strong: Alleluia! Through darkness, pain and strife, I'll Sing, Be, Live, See...

Peace.

#### THERE WILL BE REST

-- Poetry by Sara Teasdale

There Will Be Rest, like Constellation, was inspired by my long-standing love for the poetry of Sara Teasdale. "There Will Be Rest," one of her last poems, is a perfect summary of her lifelong reverence for the stars and their eternal promise of peace. I have striven to capture the poem's purity of spirit in this delicately lyrical choral setting.

The work was commissioned by The Pacific Chorale; it is dedicated to the memory of Cole Carsan St.Clair, the son of my dear friends, Carl and Susan St.Clair.

There will be rest, and sure stars shining Over the roof-tops crowned with snow, A reign of rest, serene forgetting, The music of stillness, holy and low. I will make this world of my devising, Out of a dream in my lonely mind, I shall find the crystal of peace—above me, Stars I shall find.

### **BIOGRAPHIES:**

ABOUT FRANK TICHELI: Frank Ticheli's music has been described as "optimistic and thoughtful" (Los Angeles Times), "lean and muscular" (New York Times), "brilliantly effective" (Miami Herald) and "powerful, deeply felt crafted with impressive flair and an ear for striking instrumental colors" (South Florida Sun-Sentinel). Ticheli (b. 1958) joined the faculty of the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music in 1991, where he is Professor of Composition. From 1991 to 1998, Ticheli was Composer in Residence of the Pacific Symphony.

His orchestral works have received considerable recognition in the U.S. and Europe, and many of his works for concert band have become standards in the repertoire. In addition to composing, he has appeared as guest conductor of his music at Carnegie Hall, at many Ameri-

can universities and music festivals, and in cities throughout the world. Ticheli is the recipient of a 2012 "Arts and Letters Award" from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, his third award from that prestigious organization. His Symphony No. 2 was named winner of the 2006 NBA/William D. Revelli Memorial Band Composition Contest. Other awards include the Walter Beeler Memorial Prize and First Prize awards in the Texas Sesquicentennial Orchestral Composition Competition, Britten-onthe-Bay Choral Composition Contest, and Virginia CBDNA Symposium for New Band Music

Ticheli was awarded national honorary membership to Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, "bestowed to individuals who have significantly contributed to the cause of music in America," and the A. Austin Harding Award by the American School Band Directors Association, "given to individuals who have made exceptional contributions to the school band movement in America." At USC, he has received the Virginia Ramo Award for excellence in teaching, and the Dean's Award for Professional Achievement.

Frank Ticheli received his doctoral and masters degrees in composition from The University of Michigan. His works are published by Manhattan Beach, Southern, Hinshaw, and Encore Music, and are recorded on the Albany, Chandos, Clarion, Delos, Equilibrium, Klavier, Koch International, Mark, Naxos, and Reference labels.

**ABOUT JOHN ALEXANDER:** Artistic Director of Pacific Chorale since 1972, John Alexander has received consistent acclaim for his inspired leadership, both on the podium and as an advocate for the advancement of the arts: he is also well known as a composer. In his long and distinguished career, he has conducted hundreds of performances of choirs and orchestras in 27 countries around the globe. Noted as a specialist in conducting the choral/orchestral masterworks, he is also a strong proponent of American music, programming groundbreaking works by California composers and bringing many West Coast and world premieres to Southern California performance halls.

Choruses prepared by John Alexan-

der have performed under many of the most renowned conductors on the world stage, including Zubin Mehta, Pierre Boulez, Seiji Ozawa, Michael Tilson Thomas, Leonard Slatkin, Esa-Pekka Salonen, Gustavo Dudamel, Lukas Foss, Max Rudolf, Carl St.Clair, Gerard Schwarz, Marin Alsop, John Mauceri, John Williams, and Keith Lockhart.

ABOUT PACIFIC CHORALE: Founded in 1968, the 140-voice Pacific Chorale is internationally recognized for exceptional artistic expression, stimulating American-focused programming, and influential education programs. Pacific Chorale presents a significant performance season of its own at the Segerstrom Center for the Arts and is sought regularly to perform with the nation's leading symphonies. Under the inspired guidance of Artistic Director John Alexander, Pacific Chorale has infused an Old World art form with California's hallmark innovation and cultural independence.

In addition to its long-standing partnership with Pacific Symphony, the Chorale has performed with the Los Angeles Philharmonic in Disney Hall on numerous occasions. Other noted collaborations include the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra, the Boston Symphony, the National Symphony, and the Long Beach, Pasadena, Riverside and San Diego symphonies. John Alexander and the Chorale have toured extensively in Europe, South America and Asia.

#### ABOUT JOHN ALEXANDER SINGERS:

The John Alexander Singers, Pacific Chorale's professional chamber choir, is a 24-voice ensemble of outstanding choral musicians from throughout Southern California. While most of these singers also serve as part of the Pacific Chorale's professional core, their work focuses on specialized repertoire appropriate for a professional chamber chorus.

The Pacific Chorale regularly presents the John Alexander Singers in concert venues throughout Southern California. The Singers have collaborated extensively with The Pacific Symphony, the Los Angeles Philharmonic and other orchestras and period ensembles; they have also worked with leading chamber ensembles and dance companies. The ensemble has served as the resident chorus for several arts festivals sponsored by the California State University system, and has been featured at the American Choral Directors Association conference in Los Angeles in 2000 as well as other notable conferences. The John Alexander Singers made its European debut in 2012, performing in Paris, France. The group has made two recordings: Sweet Harmony, featuring music by Frank Ticheli and John Alexander, among others; their follow-up CD - Shenandoah: Songs of the American Spirit - is available on the Gothic label.
